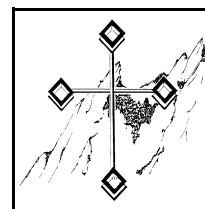

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A Letter from the Pastor

Greetings in the name of Christ Jesus!

“Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty! All thy works shall praise thy name in earth and sky and sea. Holy, Holy, Holy, merciful and mighty! God in three persons, blessed Trinity!”

These powerful words come from my favorite hymn, “Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty.” I’d sung the hymn countless times in earlier years, but it wasn’t until I came to the Lutheran faith through Lutheran Campus Ministries of CU Boulder in 1993 that I was moved to tears for the first time when I really thought about this text. That our Great God is HOLY, MIGHTY, and MERCIFUL. That triune Divinity touches us through God, our Savior Jesus Christ, and the simultaneously gentle and thunderous Holy Spirit.

And that finally, ALL of God’s works, beings, and entities shall PRAISE the Holy Name of the Creator from watery, heavenly, and earthly domains. This imagery is very real to me. From time to time, we are touched directly by a breathless moment of divine awareness. My first time walking into the ancient and gargantuan sanctuary of Germany’s Cologne Cathedral was a moment I will treasure till my dying day. Taking in the magnificence of God’s Creation from the top of the French Alps; sailing with longtime friends under the summer sun of Lake Ontario outside Rochester, NY; hearing for the very first time the haunted “Requiem” by Maurice Durufle at a small farm in Mendon, UT in 1986; witnessing my brother’s full recovery from a near-fatal car accident; standing at my father’s coffin on a gorgeous, sunny October afternoon at a small cemetery in Camas, WA, surrounded by loved ones, knowing my father had given me music, enthusiasm for the outdoors, appreciation of cultures beyond our own, a passion for good food and drink, and an awareness of spiritual depth in all we do. What profound gifts!

Today I am missing Al Muklebust and Neala Koth, our brother and sister at Mount Calvary,

whom we buried recently. They were both generous spirits and will be missed by many in this beautiful community. It simply leads us to remember that life is short, precious, and a gift from our Lord. We may not have much time. In joy and peace let us love each other *now, fully, and generously*. Let us commit all of our gifts, activities, and passions to our Lord God in Heaven. In good days and in bad, we are Children of God through Jesus Christ our Savior. It is far more than any word, song, building, mountaintop, or even cherished love can express.

In singing this hymn, and the others in worship, let us look at texts in a new way. Let us be encouraging and loving to one another, not because we ought to, but because Christ has loved us through *every* moment. As Pastor Kevin says with great truth, "He loves you as you are."

May you know spiritual riches abounding in open hearts and nourished spirits this summer.

In the coming year we will celebrate with **FOUR CONCERTS** at MOUNT CALVARY. Mark your calendars NOW, folks. Along with the Worship Planning Committee and members of our Advertising Committee, we want to **FILL THE PEWS** for these extraordinary events!!

Saturday, November 8, 7:00 p.m.: *Requiem Op. 120*, a nine-movement work, which I am composing for thirty-piece orchestra and fifty-voice choir, will have its full debut here at Mount Calvary.

Our friend Dramatic Soprano Julie Mark will return as one of the soloists, along with Wagnerian Soprano Karen Patterson and Baritone Erik Angerhofer. My family and friends from both coasts will be flying in to attend, and we will be welcoming singers from Metropolitan State College, colleagues from other denominations, and orchestral members of all ages. This will be a *memory gift* for my mother, Carole A. Myers, one year and three months after my father's passing, and will occur on her 71st birthday (November 7, 1937).

Saturday, December 13, 3:00 p.m.: *Christmas Celebration at Mount Calvary Lutheran Church.*

We will herald in the coming of the Christ child with stunning musical offerings from families within the church community, including our own Women's Gospel Ensemble, Men's and Women's Ensembles, Youth and Children, *Joyful Noise* Handbell Choir, and the Festival Choir, with Kristina Eller at the organ. Don't miss this spectacular and joyous annual celebration!!

Saturday, March 7, 2009, 4:00 p.m.: *A Mother's Love.*

We will welcome English Soprano Sue Field (London/San Francisco) to our Lenten Journey at Mount Calvary. Her phenomenally clear, honest, and gentle voice has been featured nationally in vocal chamber works and oratorio. The centerpiece of this concert will be the powerfully moving *Stabat Mater* by Giovanni Pergolesi (1710–1736) for soloists and choir. At the height of the Baroque, in his last year of life, Pergolesi composed this sublime piece conveying a mother's harrowing loss of her beloved son at the foot of the cross.

Saturday, May 30, 2009, 3:00 p.m.: *Angels and Trumpets*.

Our closing choral concert in the spring will underscore the text from one of my favorite Biblical passages, I Thessalonians 4: 16–18. It reflects the voice of the archangel and calls of the trumpets accompanying the Lord's descent from Heaven. The dead rising, the living rising, and all joined together in the clouds to meet our Lord at last—in this realm we remain forever. Plan to join the vocal and instrumental ensembles of Mount Calvary as well as guest artists for this memorable tribute to music that celebrates our God!

Also, on Sunday, March 22 (Lent IV), we will worship together at the 10:30 service in the manner of the eighteenth century Lutheran Church of J.S. Bach (Thomaskirche, Leipzig). Borrowing from historical records and musical resources of the era, we will recreate the atmosphere, structure and musical presence of Bach's time, on the 323rd anniversary of his birth!!

Don't be shy —contact me at any time if you are interested in playing or singing in any of our ensembles at any time of year. If you only wish to sing during Advent or Lent or at a concert, that is fine with me! Also—if you have favorite hymns, solos, or anthems you would like to hear during the coming year, let me know. I'm eager to "plug in" such requests as appropriate to text and church calendar.

Last, through the year there will be Sundays devoted to particular affiliations of ELCA Lutherans: National Days of Germany, Finland, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, and Ice-

land; Martin Luther King, Jr. Sunday; Reconciled in Christ Sunday with our Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgendered sisters and brothers; and days highlighting Volunteers, Independence Day, Spanish and African heritage, Bluegrass, Youth Day—and of course our own Martin Luther on Reformation Sunday!!

Wishing each of you a year rich in blessings and warmth in Christ's love.

2008 Rocky Mountain Synod Conference

You may not think that a Rocky Mountain Synod Conference is a good way to start the Memorial Day Weekend, but, I prefer to think of it as three great days at the Hyatt. Ruth Forsburg, Pastor Kevin, and I represented Mount Calvary as the voting delegates to this year's Synod Conference. And yes, it was held at the Hyatt. *Did you know that the Hyatt in Denver employs over 150 immigrants that Lutheran Family Service is helping? It's true.* And yes, it began on the day of the terrible tornados. There were 525 hearts joined into one common prayer that day. Everyone was praying for the safety of those people in Windsor and Greeley and Laramie and everywhere in between. *Do you know how many hours it took to get Lutheran Emergency Team members in the air on their way to Colorado? One hour. That's right. ONE hour.* As Bishop Bjornborg said that day, "it's good to know that someone is always on the other end of the line when we need to make that call."

The theme that wove its way throughout the conference was the twentieth anniversary of the formation of the ELCA. Twenty years may not seem so long to a congregation that is 120 years old. But, if we look back only twenty years at the changes in the ELCA and the changes at Mount Calvary, we would all be amazed. To put it all in perspective, Diana Butler Bass made two presentations about the depth of mainstream religions—Lutherans included.

She made two points that were important for me and important for Mount Calvary also. One quote spoke to me. It's actually a quote from Shakespeare, and it's carved on the National Archives building in Washington. The quote: "What's Past, is Prologue." Our history, whether it be the ELCA's or Mount Calvary's, is the foundation for the greatness that is to come. It's the background for a wonderful story that's being written right now.

Her second point that I took away was that we can't look back at the "good old days." Yes, we need to look back. We need to learn from our history, but we can't think of that time as the "good old days." If we do, there is a hidden assumption that the "good" is over and past. And it certainly is not. We have the great new days ahead of us. Great days for Mount Calvary and the Rocky Mountain Synod and the ELCA

I hope that you can feel just a little of the inspiration that I gained at this year's Synod Conference. I also hope that more people from Mount Calvary will consider attending the conference next year. And, the 2009 conference will be a special treat because it is being held in El Paso. Plus, it won't interfere with your holiday weekend plans because it will be April 30–May 2. Give it some consideration.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Through May, Mount Calvary has an operating **deficit** of \$23,224. The deficit continues to grow a little bit each month. Please see the chart below to see how we have done in the previous two years. While we continue to do well compared to the budget that was passed, remember that we passed a “negative” budget, anticipating that revenue would grow. So far, this has not occurred.

Go Forth Sharing

The parking lot is nearly finished, and it is estimated that the final cost will be \$330,000. This estimate is within \$5,000 of the original estimate from last summer, although we have had to eliminate the new sign and a trash enclosure from the scope of the work. We have already paid \$129,000, leaving us with an anticipated bill of \$200,000. We currently have \$188,143 on hand, resulting in a shortfall of \$11,858. The congregation passed a resolution last meeting to allow the council to cover this shortfall using a number of various “designated funds” on the balance sheet in combination with a new loan. Once the parking lot has been paid, Mount Calvary will no longer be able to use these funds to cover any short term debt. We have had the luxury of doing exactly that for the last four years, so our short fall in income will become a serious issue later this summer unless our giving increases.

An Easy Way to Pay

For many years, Mount Calvary has had a brokerage account, enabling people to give stock rather than cash as a contribution. This enables someone to donate stock that may have increased in value over the years without having to pay any capital gains tax on the gain. We switched brokerage firms this year, and the process to move stock is very easy. If you want to donate stock, give Beth Shannon a call in the church office and she will give you our account and special routing number.
