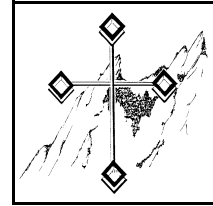


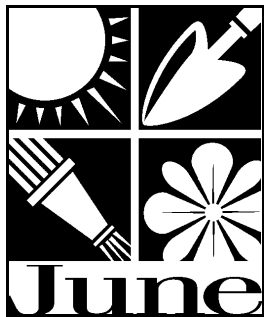

A Letter from the Pastor

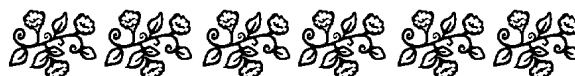
Greetings in the name of Christ!

Summer is almost upon us...I had forgotten how much I enjoy the coming of spring and summer. The grass underfoot is so soft and green. The lengthening of the days is an open invitation to leave the indoor activities behind and enjoy this beautiful place at the foot of the Flatiron mountains. Whether it is running, biking, hiking or just watching the changes on the mountain peaks to our west...the journey through spring into summer is a delightful time that is so filled with hope and expectation.

This seasonal sense of change is happening here at Mount Calvary. You may have heard that the worship schedule change happens June 8. We will continue to have our two services on Sunday morning. The first will be at 8:00 a.m. and the second at 9:30 a.m. Each will have a distinct feel musically and be somewhat abbreviated. We are hopeful that each service will be about fifty minutes in length.

Some may wonder why the change in worship times? It is the considered opinion of the leadership that to shorten the length of time to thirty minutes between services in the summer may promote a spirit of community that is impossible to maintain when services are ninety minutes apart. We are hopeful that some early service attendees will plan to stay past service to meet and greet their friends who regularly attend the late service and those who attend the late service will come early to fellowship. It would be a marvelous thing to see the whole community gathered for a few minutes each Sunday. At the end of the summer we will take some time to invite feedback about perceived strengths in this summer worship schedule.

Another exciting change that is underway with the coming of spring and summer includes the hiring of a new youth director. It is my hope that by the time you read this letter we will have had an offer accepted by the



candidate, who was carefully vetted by many students, parents, and the staff at Mount Calvary. I can say with great enthusiasm that the selected candidate has the necessary gifts that are unique to youth ministry. His delightful way of looking at the world is contagious. He connects to youth in a way that is very special. And this is not something that we have just observed—one very honest reference said of him, “he is one of the best I have seen work with youth.”

There is one more long-awaited change finally being completed...our parking lot. I am uncertain how many of you are aware of the many details that have come together to make the east and west lots more user-friendly. At the east end of the east lot, the level has been raised some two to three feet. While that may not sound like a lot of elevation gain, it makes that end of the lot useable by many more people. For example, the slope is not so steep that cars slide into each other if it is icy. The west lot has been re-graded as well. Here the upward slope to the west is more in line with the needs of all people. It has also been carefully landscaped to remain in keeping with the other landscaping here at Mount Calvary. Thank you for your support and contributions to the appeal known as “Go Forth Sharing.”

I must also say that change is sometimes quite sad. In these last weeks, we have heard of too many within our community affected by illness and death. I think especially of Al, our sexton, who quite unexpectedly has been diagnosed with untreatable cancer and has entered hospice care. It is heartwarming to see his family gather around him to support and spend time with him and at the same time difficult to confront the truth that we rely on...the truth that we proclaim each Easter. Saying goodbye is never easy and this time it is especially difficult despite the hope we have in Christ.

May God guide and strengthen us as a community this summer.

Our journey has included our service and picnic at Ryssby Church, extraordinary Reformation and Christ the King services, and participation of the entire Mount Calvary community in our Advent and Christmas celebrations. Wednesday night Lenten services, service of healing, Holy Week, and a phenomenal Easter Sunday brought the worship experience to new levels. We have welcomed guest artists here, with soprano Julie Mark at the start of Lent and soprano Jacquelynne Fontaine at Pentecost, presenting dynamic, powerful concerts of great beauty. My heartfelt thanks go to many people who have been a part of the music team in developing a strong, vibrant ministry. Gladi Lefferdink, Kristina Eller, Melissa Johnson, Keith Forstrom, Jan Osburn, Ken Eastman, Mike Richters, Bruce Hoelter, Jen Merrill, and Jane Fisher have been

enthusiastic planners and artists in our effort to build this year. And, of course, all members of the handbell choir “Joyful Noise,” first service song leaders, the Women’s Gospel Ensemble, the Men’s Ensemble, and the entire Festival Choir have put in *tremendous* energy and effort to provide Mount Calvary with the well-prepared and exuberant musical worship we have all enjoyed. There are, of course, ongoing projects. Of particular importance to me is the creation of “sacred space” for sanctuary worship, to respect the presence of God, and to respect our fellow Lutherans in all parts of the service. We have noted a rather energetic amount of talking during anthems, preludes, and other parts of worship. While certainly not one to discourage fellowship, I do feel that, as it states in Ecclesiastes, there is a “time and place for all things under Heaven.” I would encourage congregants to seek out that which is sacred, respectful, and quiet during service music. Musicians offer their gifts out of love, and much time and energy goes into our preparation. Please open ears, hearts, and spirits to the immediate and nourishing experience of music.

This summer we will rejoice in beloved songs, hymns, and well-known liturgy, simplified and refreshing. I will continue composing my “Requiem Op. 120,” preparing for the November 8 concert. And the Music Library project will be underway, creating a database of all our musical resources for easy access and organization. Please speak with me should you have any particular favorites in terms of hymns and anthems. I’ll be working on fall planning later in the summer and always welcome input from folks with personal favorites.

TREASURER’S REPORT

Through April, Mount Calvary has an operating **deficit** of \$21,617. Please see the chart below to see how we have done in the previous two years. The deficit is slightly worse than the previous two months, so in general, our giving patterns remain consistent. We have our semi-annual congregational meeting on June 1, so please be prepared to attend and discuss what we want to do about this issue.

Go Forth Sharing

The Go Forth Sharing capital campaign “officially” ended in April. Thanks to your generous contributions, we have raised almost \$490,000 since the campaign began in 2005. There is approximately \$30,000 left in pledges that have not been completely fulfilled. Of course, we will gladly continue to receive any additional contributions to this fund until the parking lot is completed.

Fun in the Sun

Summer is here! It is time to enjoy the season and the freedom from jackets, snow boots, and all the winter paraphernalia. Nothing cuts into enjoyment like an accident or injury, so here are a few tips to keep your summer safe.

Sunscreen should be used every time you are in the sun, and reapplied at least every two hours and more frequently if swimming or sweating heavily. Children or teens that receive at least two blistering sunburns are at increased risk of developing skin cancer in later life. Babies younger than six months should be kept out of the sun as much as possible. If an infant cannot be kept out of the sun or covered up, use a small

amount of sunscreen on his/her exposed skin. In addition to using sunscreen, keep out of the sun as much as possible between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., and cover up with hats and clothing.

Mosquito bites can cause West Nile disease. Insect repellent should be used when contact with mosquitoes can be anticipated. Mosquitoes are most active at dawn and dusk. Children over two months should have repellent applied. Do not spray repellent directly to a child's skin; spray it on your own hands and then rub it on the child. Do not apply it to the child's hands, as children are constantly putting their hands in their mouths. Most repellents contain DEET. For DEET alternatives, go to www.bouldercounty.org and search for West Nile disease. Wear protective clothing when exposure is likely (long sleeves and pants), and drain standing water around your home. Combination sunscreen/insect repellent products are not recommended because the sunscreen needs to be applied more often than the repellent should be.

NEWS FROM OUR INTERN

It is Colorado in Alaska! At least that is what it felt like a few weeks ago. I was in Anchorage attending the Alaska Synod Assembly, and in the morning the rain turned to snow. By four in the afternoon there were twenty-one inches of snow on the ground! It was an exciting spring snow and quite unexpected. I had flown down to Anchorage with our two delegates. My supervising pastor drove down with her dog and left her winter coat at home. It became my first Synod Assembly experience in Alaska and my first time preaching unexpectedly that Sunday morning. Pastor Susan did not make it back to Fairbanks. It was a good test of how quickly and well I could put a sermon together and lead worship. Luckily the Holy Spirit was working within me!

It has been a very different spring in Alaska. Even in the beginning of May, blossoms have not appeared. The temperatures have just gotten into the fifties on a regular basis. The light, on

the other hand, has become longer and longer. The sun is rising at 4:00 a.m. and setting at 11:30 p.m. It seems like it should be summer, but the ice on the river tells us otherwise. Summer will come shortly, and so the city is preparing for tourists and the color brown to change into green.

Nick and I are awaiting changes as well. We found out that we will be headed to Victoria, Texas in August. Nick was assigned to Trinity Lutheran church for his internship experience. It will be quite a change from Alaska! We laugh about wearing shorts in fifty degree weather in Alaska, but know we will be putting on a wool sweater when the temperatures drop in Texas. We are excited to still be feasting on seafood, though. We will be fixin' to leave Fairbanks at the end of July and will be fixin' to make the drive all the way down to Texas (we are practicing our Texan dialect).

We continue to appreciate your care and concern and prayers for us during this part of our seminary experience. We continue to keep Mount Calvary in our prayers.

World Food Emergency Prompts Special ELCA Assistance

CHICAGO (ELCA)—With the price of food rising, especially in the world's poorest regions, members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) will send an initial \$100,000 to companion churches and partner relief agencies to provide food to vulnerable people and to strengthen development work in rural communities. ELCA International Disaster Response allocated \$50,000 and the other half of the amount will come from money the ELCA World Hunger Appeal received in addition to reaching its goal for 2007.

The high cost of energy that makes it more expensive to produce food, increasing demand

in emerging economies, the use of grain as a fuel source and weather—drought and floods in different regions that have damaged crops—are factors in a global food crisis, said the Rev. Rafael Malpica Padilla, executive director, ELCA Global Mission.

Those factors have combined with food security issues—international trade policies, access to markets, government subsidies of farmers, and global distribution of wealth and resources—and a widening circle of long-term issues—environmental degradation, oil depletion, population pressure and water scarcity, Malpica Padilla said.
