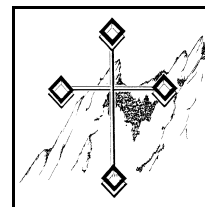
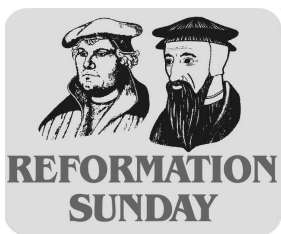

Pastor Kevin J. Meyer

Interviewed by Jessica Gribble

It only made sense to begin our interviews with Pastor Kevin J. Meyer, who began his service as pastor of Mount Calvary Lutheran Church in January 2007. Many of us know him well after nearly two years of ministry together, but sometimes the small details get lost when we're talking about big, important church matters. For instance, did you know that Pastor Kevin played the trumpet in the marching band through high school? Or that his favorite ice cream flavor is vanilla?

I met Pastor Kevin for coffee at Ozo last week. He had been suffering with aching sinuses for a few days, but he gallantly agreed to come out and be interviewed anyway. We sat outside, on a cool but bright fall day, and chatted about his life. Kevin J. Meyer was born in Ohio on December 26, 1965. I asked if he had a nickname as a kid, and we both chuckled when he said "Kev." I'd been hoping for something like "the big cheese," but he assured me that there were no funny stories to tell. His dad's side of the extended family is either Danish or German—they lived in the contested area between the two countries, Schlesvig and Holstein, duchies which were Danish during some historical periods and German at other times. His mom's family was Scottish or English, but had been American

for several generations. Pastor Kevin told me that his mom was a domestic engineer during his growing up years—he was clearly in awe of her scheduling skills, explaining that she could've scheduled for the biggest accounting firms without batting an eye. She then became a school librarian, along with looking after three kids. His dad was a professional fundraiser for mainly Lutheran institutions and remains a consultant during his retirement.

Young Kevin grew up with a brother and a sister, but his sister Carol died when they were children and his sister Linda came along afterwards. His brother Dwayne now lives in Wisconsin with his wife and two children and Linda lives in Vancouver with her husband and two children. Pastor Kevin remembers Linda's baptism as one of the most memorable events in his growing-up years; he and Dwayne and their parents stood around the baptismal font and everyone was clearly happy. He could tell that healing had taken place after the sorrow of Carol's death.

I wondered if this event led directly to his decision to become a pastor, but it turns out that teenage Kevin had other ideas; he planned to become a fighter pilot in the U.S. Air Force. When that path didn't work out, he headed to Dana College, where he'd been recruited into the chemistry department thanks to a near-perfect ACT score in the natural sciences. However, there were too few people in the program for Kevin's liking, so he switched to a double major in business administration and accounting, with an economics minor. He also switched from his high-school trumpet playing to the New Day Singers.

College brought something else important—Kevin met his future wife, Kristin, there. After one year of work as an accountant at a manufacturing firm, Kevin began seminary at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa. Dubuque was seven hours from Kristin, who was still in college. That contributed to Kevin's decision to do five units of hospital chaplaincy—not only was he considering chaplaincy as a career, his service in a Des Moines hospital was only two hours from Kristin.

The two were married when Kristin graduated and Asher was born nine years later. I won-

dered how they chose Asher's name, so Pastor Kevin told me that he asked Kristin to choose about five names that she liked and he would choose among those—he, like many people, found the baby book in its entirety a bit intimidating! Asher turned out to be a great name for some interesting religious reasons: not only is Asher one of the twelve tribes of Israel, but in the gospel of Luke, Anna of the tribe of Asher proclaims the Christ child after his birth.

I asked Pastor Kevin if anything surprised him about Colorado when he and his family moved here, but he had already spent plenty of time in the state and knew what to expect. He's been thinking some interesting thoughts about how people's geographic locations contribute to their outlooks on life—ask him about the difference between Texans and Coloradans, or Boulderites and people who grow up on the Western slope. He's been reading Colorado history and Mount Calvary history, trying to understand what makes people here tick. This kind of analysis perfectly combines his ministerial people skills with his economics background. It turns out that Pastor Kevin has lived in eight states, so he's seen a lot of different scenery and people from different backgrounds! (Ohio, Southern California, Georgia, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Texas, and Colorado) This might explain why his favorite family activity is long car trips.

I thought it would be fun to know a few interesting facts about the man who leads us in worship. Here goes:

- Favorite color? Green, the color of bluegrass.
- Favorite food? Steak. (I pressed him on the cut, so he chose ribeye).
- Last movie he saw? *The Bourne Ultimatum*
- Pet? Karma the dog, who looks like a flat-coated retriever
- Music? He's an 80s guy. (I didn't want to embarrass him, so I didn't insist on a band.)
- Favorite sport to watch? College and professional baseball.
- Favorite sport to play? Hiking—he could hike four hours every day, if given the chance!
- Favorite religious holiday? Easter.
- Favorite secular holiday? Fourth of July.

- Trips outside the United States? Mexico, Canada, England, Germany, Italy.
- Morning or night person? No preference. (Is this possible?)
- Favorite class in seminary? Pastoral care and Biblical study. Like everyone, he was intellectually challenged by systematic theology.
- Computer screen saver? A photo of Asher.
- Favorite smell? Colorado after an afternoon rain.

Finally, a few important things about Pastor Kevin. What dream would he attempt, if it came with challenges that could be met? He'd love to take Kristin and Asher on a backcountry trip like the one he took in Alaska. I wanted to know how he sees God working in his life. He told me that when he wakes up in the morning with hope for what's ahead, he sees God in his life. He sees his life as a set of volumes bookended by baptism on one side and Christ's death and resurrection on the other. The volumes of his life are then his response to the generosity of God. "God leads us," he told me earnestly, "and if we're aware and awake, we follow." Pastor Kevin's theology—and his gratefulness to God for the amazing gifts of those bookends—is summarized by his favorite Bible verse: Ephesians 2:8, "For by grace you have been saved by faith."

I would encourage every member of Mount Calvary to set this time aside. Lives are busy, and schedules get filled. Please plan to come to Mount Calvary to celebrate this new music and remember your own loved ones already passed into the Heavenly realm.

FROM OUR CHURCH COUNCIL PRESIDENT

Hello again from your church council. Last month I mentioned that we will be trying to take a more active role in the many ministries of Mount Calvary. I won't repeat the list of council liaisons again this month, but they will be on the church website if you need a quick review. I would urge you all to contact the appropriate council member if you have any thoughts or suggestions.

As was the case last month, year-to-date giving is down when compared to this time

last year. This puts Mount Calvary in an extra-difficult position, as we passed a very aggressive budget last January. As you will recall, we have taken the initiative to adjust the budget for the remainder of the 2008 fiscal year in order to bring spending more in line with giving. At the same time, we have already begun the fall stewardship campaign. Based on the recommendation of the Stewardship Committee, we will be returning to the practice of opening pledges in order to better estimate giving for the 2009 budgeting process. For this strategy to be successful, we really need to increase the overall number of pledging members.

On a happier note, we believe that we have received the final invoice for the parking lot. While there are still some landscaping issues to sort out, we are finally looking at the end of the parking lot project! I would also like to call attention to all of the hard work that's been undertaken by the Property Committee. No doubt you've noticed the holey roof above the hallway connecting the education building to the sanctuary, but are you aware of the leaks in the ceiling that Rainbow has endured for years? The Property Committee will be working on remediation for both of these issues in the coming weeks. There will also be a fix-it-up day at the Rainbow Child Care Center on October 4. Please come and lend a helping hand.

Halloween Safety; Flu Reminder

“Trick or Treat”! We will soon be hearing these words, as Halloween falls on Friday, October 31. Sadly, Halloween can sometimes be a dangerous time. Here are some tips to make it a fun and safe day.

Halloween night is one of the most dangerous times of the year for child pedestrians, according to Colorado state health officials. Children are *four times* more likely to be hit by a car on Halloween than any other night. Darting out into the street is one of the most common causes of pedestrian-related deaths among children. Children should be at least twelve years old to trick-or-treat without adult supervision. Teach children to walk, not run, while trick-or-treating. Remind them to stop at all street corners before crossing, and teach them to cross streets only at intersections and crosswalks. Teach kids to look left, right, and left again before crossing the street and to continue looking both ways as they cross. *Instruct them never to dart out into a street or cross between parked cars.* Do not permit children to bicycle, roller-blade, or skateboard.

To increase visibility, plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping. Add reflective tape to costumes and bags. Use make-up instead of masks, as masks may limit vision, especially if poorly fitting. Everyone should carry a flashlight. If your children will be trick-or-treating outdoors, make sure their costumes will keep them warm enough. There is some truth to the urban legend that it always snows in the Denver-Boulder area at Halloween. Snow falls on Halloween about once every five years. In addition, snow is on the ground another one year in five. The average temperature from 5–8 p.m. on Halloween night is 42 degrees.

A front door light is the universal symbol that a household is giving out treats. Teach your chil-

dren to go only to houses where the light is on. Tuck emergency identification discreetly into the costume. Although tampering with treats is rare, an adult should check all treats before they are eaten.

If you are giving out treats, clear away tripping hazards such as garden hoses and toys. Keep lit candles far from the door and walkways. Give out wrapped treats, and consider giving non-food treats such as party favors. Remind family drivers to be cautious on the road that night.

Talk to your children about how Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on Halloween Day, and remember the saints on November 1.

Reminder: Flu shots will be available at Mount Calvary on Sunday, October 12, between services. Ages four and up are welcome; parents must be present and sign for minor children. Cost will be \$25 for flu shots, \$35 for pneumonia shots. Flu Mist inhaled vaccine may be available; some age restrictions apply to this vaccine.

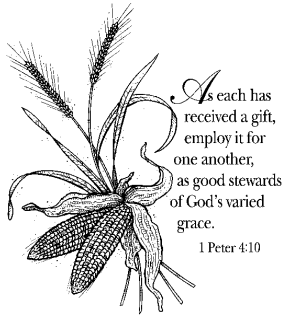
